Cher C.S.V., cher familie de Père Gaston, and brothers and sisters. Je m'excuse je vais parler anglais parce ce que mon français est très pauvre. Viateur, start your watch.

We come together to take this opportunity to thank God for blessing us all these many years with such a holy priest. It is impossible to imagine all the lives that Fr Gaston has touched in the more than sixty years that Fr. has been a CSV. How many baptisms and weddings did he perform? How many hospital visits did he make bringing the Sacraments to the sick? Over those years how many people did he comfort? How many funerals did he preside over? And how much love and joy did he bring in his serving others?

Several years ago when Br. Laurent Madore asked us to serve at the English Mass the Mass was sparsely attended, was on a trial bases and was offered for only two months a season. Much has changed since Father became our celebrant. The success of the Mass today is due to Father's love of people. Father greeted everyone with sincere happiness. He had those sparkling eyes and that big warm smile. He was especially fond of Lita and the people who clean up before Mass and all those who were regular at Mass and the sacristy was often full of people asking Father to bless rosaries, medals, children and families.

I often teased Father that he was only a simple country priest yet he taught me the

profoundness that exists within the being of a simple country priest. He was unpretentious, humble of heart, gentle, compassionate, generous, protective, sometimes he was tough as old shoe leather but he was always willing to listen and forgive. I could go on and on because we all have many wonderful memories of Father. Those memories and those experiences in a sense help us to be who we are today.

Heaven is full of undeclared saints. To be saints - That is our calling in life. Yours, mine and Father Gaston's. We are all called to be saints. That is why God created us. And since God created us to be saints, He also gave us the possibility to actually

become saints in whatever state of life we find ourselves.

When you meet someone like Father
Gaston you understand that holiness does
not have to be extraordinary. It can exist in
the ordinary, in the smallest things of
everyday life. Father reminds me of the
saying by St. Francis "preach the Gospel
always and everywhere and if you must, use
words."

I am sure the sweetest words Father Gaston will ever hear is "well done good and faithful servant"
